Gin's Leap Boggabri NSW

This striking rock face, towering over the Kamilaroi Highway outside Boggabri, has been known by many names over the years. Local Aboriginals knew it as 'Cooloobindi', whilst it was known as 'Bullaballakit' in the era when Sir Thomas Mitchell was exploring the Namoi Valley. In Cobb and Co coach days, it was known as 'The Rock' and now it goes by 'Gin's Leap'. And you thought Prince had identity issues!

The widely accepted origins of the current name follow the tragic death of a pair of ill-fated young Aboriginal lovers, a modern day Romeo and Juliet. The young girl, promised to an elder of her tribe, the Kamilaroi, ran away with a young aboriginal man from another tribe. Hotly pursued by Kamilaroi tribesmen, the lovers jumped to their deaths from somewhere along the top of this rock.

A Mr 'Baldy' Adams obtained a grant of land in the vicinity of Gin's Leap to build a hospital but changed his plans and opened The Rock Inn in 1854. The hotel was a vital stopover point and renowned landmark for 20 years. It closed around 1875, after new hotels were built in Boggabri, but parts of an old outdoor lamp from the inn remain on display at the Boggabri Historical Museum

Mr David Grover, his wife Maria (nee King) and family operated The Rock Inn for many years. Maria and her sisters Charlotte and Elizabeth arrived in Australia on board convict ship 'Fanny' in 1832. Mr and Mrs Grover are buried in a vault below Gin's Leap, along with their daughter Mrs Russell and her two-year-old son John James.

Mrs Russell was 21 when she and her son suffered fatal burns during a fiery accident involving bulk spirit handling at a Mungindi Inn. The Grover family received word of the tragedy by a man on horseback. A horse team set out to meet the coach carrying the bodies back home to Boggabri.

Mrs Grover was buried next to her daughter and grandson 25 years later in November 1891, and Mr Grover was laid to rest beside them in October 1892.

The present vault was built in 1895 by a tradesman of Danish ancestry, Mr Christy Hansen, some 200 metres west of the original grave site. A small headstone to the left of the vault belongs to Mrs Grover's niece MaryAnn Meins, who was the daughter of Charlotte and Edward Meins. MaryAnn died on

January 17, 1858, aged 19 years and was buried close to the old Rock Inn. Her headstone was moved due to road reconstruction some years ago, and was damaged during the process.

Gin's Leap stands as a silent sentinel over the grave sites. It also has a picnic area and interpretive sign.

Location Information: Gin's Leap is located 50km south east of Narrabri on the Kamilaroi Highway towards Boggabri.

Research with Timelines.

When doing family history research I have found the use of 'timelines' to be an invaluable resource. They can be simple or complex. However the use of them will and can assist you, to see and review the information you have collected. Also giving you the ability to see what information is missing.

Many 'family stories' passed-down through the generations can provide valuable information however the use of a timeline can assist to sort out some of

the facts from fiction

I use a simple 'Table' found via the 'Insert tab' on a Word document. Three columns, with as many rows as you like will suffice. It is simple to add a row or two whenever and wherever you have discovered more information however keep the information in chronicle order ... also it's just as simple to delete a row you may no longer require.

It would be worthwhile revisiting your certificates and previous research. Start a 'timeline' and enter all your information a-fresh, often you will find a piece of information or two that you may have overlooked! Names of 'witnesses' listed on certificates can be very interesting and will often show a family connection and or fellow traveller to the Australian colonies.

Fellow researcher and CDFHS member (also our webmaster) Dennis Allsopp, drew my attention to a timeline he uses and is free to download ... draw.io (just Google draw.io - o not zero). The timeline Dennis had was a very fancy timeline, with a variety of shapes recording all his information. Great for the visual presentation of his facts and very attractive to display, at an easy glace the key facts – this would be useful in a published book or booklet.

'Family Crests' and 'Coat of Arms'

Recently at the Royal Easter Show held at Homebush in April 2019, I saw a very busy stand selling Family Crests and Coat of Arms. Many people were leafing through the numerous booklets looking for **their** family name and keen to purchase a beautiful and colourful glossy scroll of their family name.

Sadly, this is very much a rort, a total rip-off. Many family historians (and members of the general public) are keen to find a connection of their family surname. However the right to display or claim a Family Crest or Coat of Arms are limited to only a few.

A **Coat of Arms** belongs to, and is unique to, an individual at any one time. For a person to have the right to a **coat of Arms** they must either have it granted to



them or be descended in a legitimate line of descent from a person to whom Arms were granted or confirmed in the past.

What is the difference between a Coat of Arms and a Family Crest: The terms "coat of arms" and "crest" are often used interchangeably, but there are differences between the two. ... A crest refers to what is displayed on top of the helmet. A coat of arms refers to the shield, but might also refer to the surcoat worn over the armour of a knight; literally a coat of arms.

My parents proudly have on display two family crests for their surnames: Francis and Strachan, on their loungeroom wall. I have tried many times to explain they really are not entitled to claim them as their right. However they assure me the salesman said because they were their surnames that they were entitled to them. I have pointed out the obvious ... 'salesman' ... that it is all about money. I would not use these crests in any family history publication because I know we are not entitled to them.

This article is just an awareness ... please don't get caught up in the hype of something you are not entitled to.

My Elusive Thomas Williams by Esma Hannah

My great grandfather, Thomas Williams, appeared from nowhere. He met and courted my great grandmother, Maria, while she was still married to Charles Isaac. Charles and Maria had 4 children. Maria bore Thomas 2 children, the first, Sarah Olive being born 2 months after Charles Isaac died, and William born in 1852. Both these children died just a day apart, 2 months before Thomas and Maria legally married 19 June 1854.

Thomas and Maria went on to have 4 more children, 2 females and 2 males. The next female in line was another Sarah Olive, then Fanny Maria, my grandmother, followed by William Henry and Frederick Anthony. I must state here that there is a gap of 97 years between the birth of my grandmother, Fanny Maria and myself.

Another researcher, Bob, had it that Thomas Williams was a convict. I asked Bob where he got that information and he said that it was the only Thomas Williams that fitted the time frame. It didn't take much to disprove this as this particular Thomas Williams married another ex convict in the Catholic Church at Parramatta

There was also a Thomas Williams who came on the same ship as Charles and Maria Isaac. Could he be the one I was after. This Thomas came from Bishopstone, Wiltshire, the same town as Charles and Maria. I checked this family out thoroughly, and although I didn't discount it, I was uncertain still at the fact that Normanton, Nottingham was on the birth certificate of son, Frederick Anthony.

All avenues to find Thomas Williams failed. Then came Trove, and I would spend hours copying every article I could find with the name Thomas Williams.

There were so many and how do I know which, if any could be mine. One night I searched "Maria Isaac" and up came a few articles of Maria who had been bashed by a drunken Thomas Williams. This was what I needed.

ASSAULT.—Thomas Williams, a railway labourer, was charged with violently assaulting one Maria Isaacs, with whom he cohabited. The prosecutrix deposed that, on the 12th instant, the defendant, who was much addicted to drinking, beat her in the most barbarous manner without the slightest provocation; and the marks which her head and face still bore, corroborated her testimony. The defendant was sentenced to pay a fine of £5, or in default to be imprisoned for two months. [Illustrated Sydney News 18-3-1854 page 2]

After seeing this and the other reports, I knew, being the drunkard he was, he would not have been able to pay the fine. I then went in search of gaol records. I discovered through the gaol records that Thomas Williams arrived in 1845 on the ship "Elizabeth". Going through the records, there was no Thomas Williams from Nottingham. I went through again and found a "Thomas Walster" who came from Nottingham, a town called Sutton-on-Trent. Now this town was not far from Normanton that had been listed on the birth certificate of Frederick Anthony Williams.

Thomas Walster was a bounty immigrant, assigned to work at Tocal Homestead at Paterson, NSW as a ploughman and labourer for a period of 12 months, under the employ of Charles Reynolds. On their records he was recorded as Thomas Walstor. Interesting fact was Fred Ward aka Thunderbolt and his two brothers were also at Tocal in later years.

Further checking of Thomas Walster, showed his parents as Thomas Walster and Mary Starr. Thomas and Mary had married 23 December 1819 at Sutton-on-Trent. Thomas, was baptized 14 May 1820 as was his twin brother, William. Other children born to Thomas and Mary were twins, Ann and Olive, then Rebecca, Mary and John. Now there's that name Olive.

Going back a generation, Thomas Senior's parents were Thomas Walster and Olive Dawson. Now the name holds some significance, but I still had cousins doubting what I found. I then decided it was time to do a DNA test and see what comes up. Well, I got two matches to Mary Starr. I contacted both people and they were descended from Olive Walster, my Thomas' sister. They hadn't been able to find out what happened to Thomas. I was told by these relatives

that Thomas, and his brother were raised by their grandmother, Olive.

If it wasn't for that article in Trove and the addition of DNA I would be none the wiser about Thomas Williams/Walster.

It seems history was to repeat itself, with Maria dying in 1871, and not knowing what happened to Thomas, the two younger children were raised by the publican of Ireland's Hotel at Enfield. It was said Thomas left the family home prior to the last child being born in 1860, to search for gold. I debate this has he was a drunkard. Maria was shown as a widow on her death certificate. Perhaps Thomas changed his name again and moved on. I know he is not buried with Maria at St Thomas Enfield.


