The Paul Padlesak – Peter Jansen Story By Marie Holmes

The man I always knew when I was growing up, as Peter Richard Jansen, my step-grandfather, had a very interesting early history. He was born in Germany on 14 March 1895 as Paul Hahnemann. When his mother married Wenzel Padlesak circa 1899, Wenzil acknowledged the paternity of Paul in court, and said he was the natural father of Paul who was born out of wedlock. So Paul became Paul Padlesak and grew up with three sisters. Then when he was in his early teens, a relative paid for him to go to the academy to train as a midshipman.

Paul was trained as a midshipman as an apprentice to a man on a fishing ship. It is said his Academy fees were paid for by an "uncle" who had no family of his own and was well off. He may have been Danish. He gained his qualifications as midshipman by age 16 years, ie circa 1911.

He and a couple of friends absconded from his ship and took off for America. They worked their passage and ended up in New York. They had not been paid anything for the work they did and so had no money. They went and worked on the wharves as stevedores for a couple of days but then came up against a group of stevedores who accused them of strike-breaking so they had to get out of there quickly.

Paul split up from his friends and ended up working in Canada for a farmer as a farmhand doing jobs such as mucking our and carting hay for the animals. Paul lived with the family. This farmer was also a cooper and it was from him that Paul learnt the trade of a cooper. After a bit he left the farm and teamed up again with his friends and they continued across America to California working as they went.

At California they put their names down as seamen to get a voyage for they wanted to get to Australia. Now the person from whom they had absconded had put out a notice regarding this and he was caught and deported to Europe. After a bit he again escaped and this time was careful not to go across America but got a voyage down the coast of South America and round Cape Horn. He had to work his passage and on this ship they caught fish and birds for food to supplement the the gruel type of porridge they also ate. As they went round Cape Horn they worked two hour shifts. It was hard work and they lost a man as they sailed through these waters. It was bitterly cold. It was winter and they lived in the dark most of the time. The weather got better after they left Cape Horn and sailed north. They also had more daylight. They still caught birds and fish for food to accompany the weevil ridden porridge.

Finally they arrived in Sydney. They decided to head west and went around Orange, NSW. Here they worked on farms. When war broke out they headed back to Sydney. The other German fellows got out of the area but Paul stayed. He was caught and interned somewhere in western NSW. Here they were not really treated as prisoners and went to work on farms. They were well fed. While there he met another intern by the name of Tony Yuskan whom he was to meet up with again when he was living at Cannon Valley about 1930.

It was about the time the war broke out that Paul became Peter Richard Jansen. This was the name of a man he had met. However it did not really work to his advantage. Now as Peter Jansen he had no papers to say who he was.

This brings us to after the war when as Peter Jansen he was in Sydney and met Fred Faust who introduced him to his brother Conrad, the wife of Rose (Mesure). Peter stayed with Rose's mother as a boarder in her guesthouse where Conrad and Rose also lived.


