Hi to all,


Welcome to another edition of the Ghostbuster magazine.

Newspaper Articles on Specific Families

SMH Friday 24 May 1912

The fear of burglars contributed to the death of a domestic servant named Agnes Theresa Egan who was employed at Glebe Point. At the coroners inquest to-day it was shown that she formerly slept with the windows open, but that for the last few weeks she on account of the burglar scare had kept her door and windows closed and locked. On the morning of the 9th instant she was found unconscious in her bed with the gas turned full on. She died soon after removal to the Hospital. Her friends stated that it was certain she had not committed suicide. A verdict of death from gas poisoning was returned.

Taken from Death Cert.

Coal gas poisoning administered by herself but whether accidentally or intentionally the evidence adduced does not enable me to say. Henry S Hawkins City Coroner. 22 May 1912 Sydney.

Agnes came to Aust with her parents and siblings in 1883 from Westmeath Ireland. She was 30 at the time of her death.

Agnes is the 2nd Great Aunt of Denise Baxter and Pam Shea.

The Tallawang Shanty Goes Under the Hammer.

On Saturday February 26th a large gathering of people in Coolah stood beside an old building advertised as "a 5 room cottage, comprising sawn hardwood slabs and corrugated iron roof, to be demolished and removed within 2 months." The auctioneer was finally heard to call going-going-gone for £220. People raised their eyebrows at the price being paid, surely it seemed a lot for the building, plus the cost of demolition.


I was ignorant of any history, but somehow the old place drew me back for a closer look, there was just something about that front verandah opening out onto the roadway that had that "turn of the century" bush architectural look about it. There I met the new owner Mr. Tom Lincoln who was introduced by Mr. Allan McMaster. Mr. Lincoln (call me Tom) very obligingly offered to "show me through."

We entered by the side door on the northern side and walked into a hall that extended right through the building. It was easy to see the plan now, bedrooms on the right, one large room on the left and a smaller one with a corner entrance. It was here that Tom broke into my thoughts with "I suppose you know this is the old "Tallawang Store and Wine Shanty"? Come I'll show you."

OLD BAR: Tom led us into the corner room explaining that this was the barroom. "The bar was across there see, now lift up those boards Allan and show him the cellar." Up came the boards and sure enough we were standing above the old earth cellar, too dark to see down into it but no doubt many a keg had passed through that opening.

"I can remember as a boy of 12, I came here and bought a bag of boiled lollies off Mr. Hansell for a penny" he said. The old pub was shifted here from "Stringey Bark" where the diggings were, there was about 13 wine shanties there in the Gold days.

"People wonder why I bought it, but have a look at those walls" said Tom, on investigation the walls and floors were all beautifully sawn 10"x1" ironbark slabs, a credit to any modern mill, they extended to the ceiling and were even in the hip roof. Tom explained this, he said that it was once a wooden shingle roof, before the days of iron. It was easy to understand now why the buildings' bidding was brisk! We walked out through the old pub door and there above our heads for the eyes to see COBB & CO was proudly displayed the old sign, still discernable as TALLAWANG STORE. - the last line J E HANSELL liscensed to sell.



BUSH LAWYER: It was hard to read as the years had taken their toll, but it wouldn't take any stretch of the imagination to fill that in. "What do you know of Mr. Hansell Tom" I asked? "Well he owned the shanty that stood opposite to my parents property, he was also a pretty cunning bush lawyer", he smilingly replied with a shake of his head. We yarned on for a few minutes and then stepped off the verandah with a touch of nostalgia, a pity the old landmark had to go, soon all that would remain as a reminder would be similar to that of "the Black Stump', a once used cellar, charcoal and old broken bottles. One small comforting thought, Tom promised he would give the sign to the Gulgong museum.

Tallawang Wedding

This was reported in the Sydney Morning Herald on Saturday 1.7.1911 on the social page 12.

At St. Johns' Roman Catholic Church, Tallawang on Wednesday 14th June 1911 the marriage was solomnized of Mr. William Wilson, youngest son on Mr. and Mrs. G Wilson to Miss Kathleen Morgan daughter of the late Mr. Phillip Morgan and Mrs. Margaret Morgan. The young couple both being residents of Tallawang. Reverend Father Parker was the celebrant, the church was tastefully decorated by friends. The bride wore a dress of cream Pailette Silk, richly ornamented with crystal fringe and bugle trimmings, and a wreath and veil; her shower bouquet of lilies of the valley, a gold bangle and a diamond pendant were the gifts of the bridegroom. Miss G. Wilson (sister of the bridegroom) attended as bridesmaid and wore a cream Ottoman Silk Gown trimmed with crystal embroidered net and fringe, and a pale blue velvet toque with a large blue feather and carried a shower bouquet, her gold bangle was a gift of the bridegroom.

Mr. W. M'Dermott was the Best Man. After the ceremony the wedding party adjourned to the home of the Brides Mother where the wedding breakfast was served. Later Mr. and Mrs. Wilson left for Sydney. The bride's going-away dress was a white cloth coat and skirt with a hat to match.

Kathleen born 1892 was 19 at the time of her marriage

Sydney Morning Herald reported: Tuesday 12th May 1898 that Phillip Morgan,

of Tallawang a farmer, whilst feeding a chaffcutter had his left hand drawn into the machinery with the result it was dreadfully crushed and mangled. Doctor McCREDIE successfully amputated the arm below the elbow. Phillip succumbed to his injuries two months later on 16 June 1898 aged 59-60 the result of the terrible accident.

Phillip left all his Estate to his wife Margaret including money he had in the NSW Bank in Gulgong, his "Will" had been made out on 11th May 1898 two months before he died, his Estate sworn in at £1,381.00. Because Phillip could not write the Will was drawn up and read back to him by the solicitor, he declared that he understood what was written for him and an "X" was his mark. He was one of the oldest selectors in the district of Tallawang.

Another terrible fatality was to befall this family when Phillip and Margaret's son Phillip was accidently killed on 12th June 1900 aged 15 years. Reported in the LAUNCESTON EXAMINER of Monday 18th June 1900. Phillip Morgan son of Mrs. Morgan of Tallawang, near Gulgong NSW was killed on Tuesday through the fly wheel of a chaffcutter bursting. One of the pieces smashed the top of his skull, his father Phillip Morgan was killed by the same chaffcutter two years ago when he lost his right hand and died shortly after. Yound Phillip was buried with his father in the Catholic Grave Section of the Gulgong Cemetery.

Phillip and Margaret has eight children, a very small family in those days.

Cobb & Co Stage Coach Mystery.

An 1884 Lands Department Map of the Parish of Tuckland has disclosed that a Cobb & Co coach horse stable existed on the Western side of the Gulgong-Spring Ridge – Cobboa road about 1.9 kilometres north west of the "gap" which in itself is on the boundary of the Coolah and Mudgee Shires.

This discovery is mysterious because there was no known settlement at the location and there were hotels and stagecoach stops at Cobbora, 27 kilometres north at nearby Spring Ridge, five miles to the south.

The coach stables were at the headwaters of the Woollwoolanely Creek on or near portion of the 111, taken up by Patrick Haley in 1881.

In the great days of Cobb & Co coaches, the stables were located at intervals of about thirty kilometres where there was a groom who had charge of 10 to 12

horses. The groom had the responsibility of having a fresh team of horses for the incoming coach and to unhitch and feed the tired horses. The coach driver would sound his bugle about a kilometre from the change station to alert the groom of the impending arrival.

Sydney Morning Herald, Friday 25th May 1849.

If GEORGE LINCOLN, who was transported to Van Diemans land for seven years, and came out on the "EGYPTION" in the year 1839, and is supposed to have arrived in this colony, will apply by letter to FRANK GARDINER ESQ, Byalla near Gunning NSW. He may hear of his brother "Thomas".

We have no idea if he took up the offer or where he was in the intervening years. He had been sent to POINT PUER aged 14 years in 1839

Sydney Morning Herald, Thursday 23rd December 1909, page 4, column 3.

George Lincoln, of Tallawand lost by fire all his Stacks, Implements, Sheds etc. Being completely burnt out, his loss which is estimated at £700 is not covered by insurance.

Sydney Morning Herald, Saturday 24th November 1911.

There was a litigation between Lincoln V Lincoln and others. The court heard that Mr. Wyndham Davies, instructed by Mr. F.C. Stacey of Gulgong by his agent Mr. A.B. Davies appeared for the plaintiff, George Lincoln. The defendant was not represented. This was a case in which George Lincoln sought to recover possession of 721.3/4 Acres of land in the district of Dubbo from William Lincoln his brother, a farmer of Tuclan and others. By direction of his honout a verdict was given for the plaintiff.

Sydney Morning Herald, Saturday 20th November 1915, page 15.

DUNEDOO. One of the best yields for hay has been obtained by Mr. George Lincoln of Tallawang, who cut 50 Acres and has obtained 150 ton of hay, averaging upwards of three tones of hay per acre. So far as the wheat yield is

concerned, the best results so far have been secured by the Messrs Evans Bros, who have obtained eight bags of wheat to the acre, but as stripping has not become general it is anticipated that this result will be eclipsed before operations have ceased. Very little difficulty is being experienced in securing the labout necessary for harvesting. Operations and good stack builders are receiving £1 pound a day for their labour.

This George Lincoln is the sone of the first George Lincoln (Convict).

Population Distribution: Small towns: which ones are in decline?

A number of small towns throughout Australia have been affected by falling prosperity. In 1996 there were 678 towns with between 1,000 and 19,999 people, 100 more than in 1986, and nearly 2.5 million people lived in them (an increase of about 324,000 since 1986). Of the 578 towns of this size existing in 1986, about a third (31%) had sustained population losses by 1996, with 10% declining by at least 10%. At the same time, another 47% grew by at least 10%.





On the 4th Jun we will be having Ben Mercer from Ancestry.Com who will be bringing us up to date with changes and new resources that are happening with Ancestry.Com.


A visit to State Records is being planned for March / April more news on this day will be discussed at March Meeting.
