

MISSING! MY GREAT GREAT GREAT GRANDMOTHER

Ann McKay was born at Farr, Sutherlandshire Scotland in 1771 to John and Ann McKay. She married William Munro at Farr (Tulish in Kirkile). They were the parents of five daughters and two sons. William was a shepherd and moved about quite a bit. When the Clearances came to Scotland they sailed for Australia as Bounty Immigrants on the ship James Morand arriving in Sydney in 1839. William was sent to work for Mr Glanville of St Vincent NSW (Shoalhaven). When William's work obligations were finished, the family lived at Cabbage Tree Flat about 1842 In 1853 they moved to a farm on Tapitallee Creek at Good Dog Mountain (now West Cambewarra). The farm was sold about 1857, and they moved to Bolong on the Berry Estate by the Shoalhaven River east of Bomaderry. The Munros were on this farm in 1860 at the time of the great flood. Their son Donald was postmaster at Bolong.

Donald's wife Jessie died in December 1862. From a letter Donald wrote to his brother Angus in January 1863, telling of this, we know that William was living with Donald, and that Jessie had been caring for him. However, no mention is made of Ann. This and other small facts, leads me to the belief that Ann died before Jessie probably earlier in 1862. A search of the NSW Registry Office files reveals no listing for her death, and she does not get a mention in the local newspapers. Also, I cannot find any reference to her death in the Shoalhaven Historical records. I also checked the Numbaa Cemetery records as this was where Jessie was buried. This cemetery suffered much damage from floods over the years.

When he was 86, William and his son Donald settled about 1869 at Tucharimba in the Richmond area of NSW.

My missing ancestor is more of a mystery man, although he certainly has been missing from the written chronicles of my family history on more than one occasion.

My mystery man was or is George Arthur Francis COFFEY and he certainly has

been a very illusive ancestor. I have written about him more than once but the 'case-file' is still open on him!

Let me use a timeline of events to capture his movements, timelines are great because they give you clarity and perspective, but not always answers.

George Arthur F [Francis] COFFEY was born in Darlinghurst, Sydney in April 1844 to parents John Christopher COFFEY and Margaret, nee LEGASS. He was their fourth child. John Coffey was an ex-soldier, ex-mounted policeman and possibly not a nice father. Margaret Coffey was an Irish famine girl, who arrived on the Red Rover and was a needlewoman.

For whatever reason George as a 14-year-old lad ran away from home, along with three other young lads. Their collective fathers posted an advertisement in the Sydney Morning Herald in April 1858 stating that anyone harbouring them, would face the full-force of the law.

In early June 1858, another advertisement appears and this time appealing for any information about George Arthur F Coffey, from his afflicted mother, who is in very bad health, since he left. She is also offering a £2 reward and a promise: his mother promises him forgive ness and kind treatment. The advert was placed by his father, the pleading, obviously from his mother.

Where George and his friends went is open to conjecture and the potential for the makings of a great novel, about 'the hard and harsh times' of life in early colonial New South Wales.

Disappear he certainly did. Possibly around this time and to assist his disappearance, he dropped his surname of Coffey, and used his third Christian name as his surname, possibly for the remainder of his life, to be known George Arthur FRANCIS.

With the discovery of GOLD at Ophir, near Bathurst, in 1852 would have made it easy for a young man to blend into the massive influx of foreigners heading towards the gold-fields. By early 1882, 37-year-old George Arthur FRANCIS, miner, signs the marriage register when he marries 23-year-old Jane PEISLEY in the St Stephen's, Church of England Manse, 4th January 1882.

What happened to him or where was he for those intervening 24 years remains another mystery ... did he marry? Is there another family out there that I'm waiting to discover? Not impossible.

Their first child, Arthur Henry FRANCIS was born the following year in February 1883, at Mount McDonald, near Woodstock / Cowra in the Central West and registered at Carcoar. George's occupation is listed as a 'gold miner'.

Their second child, Florence Emily FRANCIS was born in July 1884 on the Abercrombie River [this was the birthplace of her mother Jane] and her birth was also registered at Carcoar.

Their third child, Clement Hiram FRANCIS was born in October 1887, at Mount McDonald and registered at Carcoar. Mt McDonald was a thriving mining community however nowadays there is a roadside signpost, with farms and only a handful of houses visible from the said signpost and that's it. But there is also a gold mine.

Perhaps, married life with a young family, was too much for George because he appears to disappear a few months after Clement's birth. With no government supports to assist and a young family to care for, Jane develops a common-law-marriage with another miner and the family begins to roam the gold-fields.

Her new man was Robert HAYHOE [appearing around 1894] and he too, was in search of gold. Their first child was born in December 1895, Edwin Gordon FRANCIS and registered at Peak Hill however due to the strict registration laws of the times, their children were recorded under Jane's married name, with the husband's name left blank: Their second child, was Ivy Lorrie FRANCIS, born in August 1897 also registered at Peak Hill. Sadly, Ivy died the following March, when she was only 7 months old. Their third child was perhaps blessed by the Saints to guarantee his wellbeing. Harold Robert John James Joseph FRANCIS, came into the world as the year of Federation spread across Australia, born in June 1901. His birth was also registered at Peak Hill, without a father's name. During these years they were residing at McPhail and Tomingley, two other gold mining villages near Peak Hill. [There are still gold mines operational in these areas and should you ever visit, the smell of sulphur in the air, is overwhelming.]

Life it appears, was never to be an easy thing for Jane, from her birth in the wilds of the Abercrombie Rivet and until her death and final resting place at Peak Hill cemetery. And you might ask how I know about the Hayhoe connection. This is where it pays you listen to those 'family stories' from your elders and if you're sensible, you will write them down [if only].

The wonderful TROVE database was there to confirm and expand on the stories I'd heard: when Jane Francis sued Robert Hayhoe in the Peak Hill Police Court for maintenance, for their two surviving children, of whom he was the father. This was October 1901 and only months after the birth of baby Harold. In her statement Jane says her husband [George Arthur FRANCIS] had left her for 14 years and she had been living with the defendant [Robert Hayhoe] for some 7 years.

On her own again in 1901, with Arthur 18, Florence 16, Clement 14, Edwin 6 and baby Harold she managed to build a life and home for her family. Some years later sadness was to strike when Jane died suddenly in April 1907, aged only 48 years.



Trove again lists the substantial collection of goods and chattels that Jane had acquired and these are listed for auction, some weeks later after her death.?

According to the Trove newspaper notice, the executor of Jane's will authorise the sale, I often wondered who that was and what happened to the money?

The three eldest are able to make their way in the world and perhaps with times changing again, they made their way to Sydney, taking 12-year-old Edwin with them. Robert Hayhoe claimed his youngest son, 6-year-old Harold Robert JJJ and headed north and would finally reside in Brisbane, Queensland: they became known as Old Bob and Young Bob.

So, what became of George Arthur FRANCIS? He made another listing in Trove [or did he] in November 1927, as a bankrupt person in the Government


Gazette, with a declared debt due to a motor vehicle company: records one George FRANCIS of Peak Hill, he would have been approximately 83 years of age, would a finance company give credit to a person of this age and for a motor vehicle?

On their marriage certificates for the three eldest children: Arthur, Florence and Clement, from 1908 to 1912, they all listed their father as deceased. And this is where I wished I had listened to, asked questions and recorded those family stories. Because when I started my family history journey some 40 years ago, my beautiful Aunt told me a story of her grandfather [George Arthur Francis] being pushed down a goldmine shaft at Peak Hill when the new boyfriend arrived ... how I wish that I had asked her more!

Thank goodness for NSW BDM's and their official legal requirements to record these life events, as they are the tangible connections, albeit the skeleton, however we know they aren't always truthful with all the information that was provided.

The wrong George ... many people have their online Ancestry trees, recorded what I believe to be the wrong George [Arthur] FRANCIS and confuse him with the chap that lived and died at Sunny Corner, NSW.

So, the mystery continues and perhaps I will never know where my George lies buried.

My lost ancestor

WILLIAM ELIAS BURTON – born 1843 Preston Lancashire to Elias & Alice (nee Atherton) Baptised 12 November 1843 St. John's Pteston Lancashire England

On the 1871 (RG10/914 folio 40) census William is listed as a convict in Gillingham Kent. He is 28 and his normal occupation is engine driver.

I found William Elias as a 'resident' of Wormwood Scrubs Prison in London, on the 1881 census. He was unmarried and his normal occupation was Engine Driver.

The A2A site shows an entry in 1868 for a Bill of costs for the prosecution of William Elias Burton and two others for larceny and receiving at Salford Easter Quarter Sessions.

The Salford Weekly News dated 18 April 1868 has a report of the trial of William and two others for stealing 208 yards of printed cloth. He was found guilty and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment.

The Preston Guardian dated Saturday July 25th 1868 has a list of prisoners before the court at the Manchester Summer Assizes including William.

The Pall Mall Gazette dated Wednesday November 7th 1877 has a mention of William "Among the cases tried The Manchester Times dated Saturday November 10th 1877 has three articles that mention William, one on Tuesday reported as Burglary at Droylesden, another on Wednesday as The Charge against Railway Official and the last on Thursday again as The Charge against Railway Official. William was complaining to the court that every time he got a job someone would tell his employer which led to him being dismissed. At the end of this is the judge's summing up and charging William was with being a habitual criminal who has already served several sentences including the last one of 7 years imprisonment and sentenced him to a further ten years.

In 1888 William married a widow Olive Nicholson nee Hulme. There is no trace of either of them in 1891 nor of any of Olive's children from her first marriage. In 1901 Olive is living with a married son John, and is shown as married but with the surname Nicholson. No trace of William Elias. Olive's death certificate describes her as 'the widow of William E Burton'. I can find no death for William Elias Burton.




Meetings are held on 4th Saturday of each month, except for December and January, starting at 1.30 p.m.


