

WILLIAM ELIAS BURTON – you were born in 1843 in Preston Lancashire and baptized in St. John's Church of England Preston on 12th November 1843. You were the 3rd born son of Elias and his wife Alice Atherton.

Between 1845 and 1847 the family moved from Preston to Newton Heath just outside Manchester and your father became the station master at Clayton Bridge Railway Station with the family living in the station master's house.

Your father Elias died in 1865 and in 1866 all the children younger than yourself (there were now ten children altogether) were baptized in All Saints Church Newton Heath including your elder sister Mary Alice who had already been baptized in Preston shortly after she was born in 1845. For some reason you were not among them.

In 1868 you were arrested with two others and charged with receiving 208 yards of printed cloth and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment. In 1871 you were serving a sentence at the Male Convict Prison in Chatham in Kent.

By November 1877 you were once again before the court and charged with burglary – the judge heard the case over three days and summed up by saying that you were an habitual criminal who had already served several sentences including one of seven years and went on to sentence you William Elias to a further 10 years.

The 1881 census show William Elias as an inmate at Wormwood Scrubs Prison.

By 1888 you had obviously served your time because in that year you married a widow Olive Nicholson in Salford Lancashire.

Did she know of your criminal background when she married you?

After that there is no further trace you William Elias – your wife Olive appears on the 1891 census living with her married son and when she died in 1907 her son registered her death describing her as the 'widow of William Elias Burton'.

My question to you is - WHERE DID YOU GO??

Research has shown the majority of my ancestors arrived in Australia from England and or Ireland either as convicts, free settlers, some of whom arrived under the 'Free Immigration Scheme' and a few as non-sponsored paying immigrants, for whatever reasons they held. Two of those paying immigrants were brothers Abraham Jakob (g/g/uncle) and Albert Samuel Tribolet (g/g/grandfather) from Switzerland.

Abraham, known as Jacob age 24, and his brother Albert age 20, arrived at Sydney in 1858 per the 'Fanny Kirchner' which sailed from the Port of Bremerhaven in Germany in 1857 with all hands and German passenger immigrants.

From 1832 to 1974 the Port of Bremerhaven was the world-famous overseas port to seven million emigrants who left Europe with over 90% of them bound for the USA. The brothers, born in Erlach in the Canton of Berne, Switzerland, left family and friends, then travelled from their homeland, across Germany to Bremerhaven, for the journey to Australia. My question here is...'What encouraged you both to leave Switzerland and migrate to Australia, and why Australia, when the majority of migrants leaving Bremerhaven were bound for the USA??'

Also, Jacob gave information on his naturalization papers as having travelled to Braidwood, from Sydney, where he remained for eight years; then south to Geelong for five years; north to Kiandra for one year; three years at Young and finally arrived in Forbes about 1874, where he remained for 40 years till his death in 1914. I ask you this... 'What work did you do and what did you find at these many places? Did you meet the other Tribolet families in Geelong at the time? Were they related to you and if so in what way??

Also Albert, where were you and what did you do for 21 years from your arrival in 1858, until I found you mining in Forbes in 1879 and where you married in 1886?

Oh Jacob and Albert, answers to these questions would provide me with much missing information needed to complete our family stories!

It would be greatly appreciated if you could answer these questions for us.

Bankruptcy records after 1869

In most bankruptcy cases, the records held by The National Archives are confined to brief, formal entries in various register series that will establish the fact of bankruptcy but will not provide much background detail. Case files, only survive for a very small sample.

Headings:

- * Bankruptcy functions of the Board of Trade
- * Petitions to the High Court
- * Searching for a bankrupt
- * Bankruptcy appeals
- * Statistics

Notices about bankruptcy proceedings were published in the London Gazette (also available at The National Archives in ZJ 1), and in The Times. Local newspapers, held by the appropriate local record office or by the British Library Newspaper Library, Colindale Avenue, London NW9 5HE, may also contain notices and reports relating to local bankruptcies.
